Anyone can participate, regardless of gender, culture, nationality, religion or age. Locations: Europe, Asia, Australia, Africa, Middle East, No. and So. America Period: varies from a couple of weeks to months.

Locations: over 3000 projects in more than 100 countries each year. Age: Teens and older. Period: most projects (about 80%) are short-term (2-3 weeks) between May and September. There are also medium-term projects (1-3 months) and permanent projects offered all year with a minimum service of 2 weeks or 1 month, depending on the project. Fee: \$500 registration fee covers food and accommodations.

Programs/projects include: education, participant training, teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL), youth leadership, civil society and governance, capacity development and grants management, exchanges, HIV/AIDS, post-conflict transformation, and marginalized groups. Locations: worldwide. Age: high school and up. Fees: vary; some financial aid is available.

Provides urban young adults with the skills, experience, and support that will empower them to reach their potential through professional careers and higher education. Offers a free one-year program that includes: 6 months of professional training in IT, Finance or Customer Service; 6 month internship with a respected company. Provides: up to 24 college credits, weekly educational stipend throughout the program and guidance and support from a staff advisor and professional mentor. Age and other requirements: Must be 18-24 years old to apply, a high school graduate or GED recipient, from low/moderate income, a US citizen, permanent resident or have an employment authorization card, must be available 5 days a week (Monday-Friday) for the year of the program and must be highly motivated to learn new technical and professional skills.

YouthBuild programs are for low-income young people. Age: 16-24 years old. Period: participants must work full-time for 6 to 24 months toward a GED or HS

diploma while learning job skills by building affordable housing in their communities. Emphasis is placed on leadership development, community service, and the creation of a positive mini-community of adults and youth committed to each other's success. Students may earn AmeriCorps education awards through their homebuilding and other community service. At exit, they are placed in college, jobs, or both. Locations: 264 YouthBuild programs in 46 states, Washington, D.C., and the Virgin. YouthBuild offers programs in the following areas: alternative school, job training and pre-apprenticeship program, community service program, leadership development and civic engagement program, youth development program, long-term mini-community, and a community development program.

This directory is a list of some work opportunities for young people that are not the usual kinds of jobs. It is not a complete list—it is just a sampling of some interesting programs to consider. But how do you know if this directory is for you?

Are you about to leave high school, or did you recently graduate and are not ready to go directly into college or a 9-to-5 job? Are you looking for travel, adventure and opportunities to see the world with its different cultures? Do you want to help other people or work to solve some of the world's problems? Are you looking for experience that might help you decide what type of work you would like to do in the future? Are you willing to work sometimes for just a small allowance or as a volunteer?

If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, then this directory might be useful to you.

The work offered by these projects is sometimes hard and low-paying, but there are many other rewards: travel; work experience; a challenging job; and the satisfaction that comes from serving others and making a positive contribution to peace and social justice.

The required age for these programs varies. Only basic information is provided here; you must contact projects directly for more details.

A residential program open to all U.S. citizens, nationals, or lawful permanent resident aliens. Period: 10-12 months. Age: 18-24 years old. Members work in teams on projects in an assigned region. Teams are trained in CPR, first aid and other skills. Locations: nationwide. Provided: a living allowance of approximately \$4,000 for 10 months of service, housing, meals, limited medical benefits, up to \$400/month for childcare if eligible; plus a monetary award at the end the program that can be used pay back qualified student loans or pay for future education (\$5645 in 2014, varies from year to year).

Period: full-time for 1-2 years. Provided: room and board, medical insurance, transportation to project, \$100-\$150/month stipend for 1st year of service. Some domestic placements offer AmeriCorps student financial aid awards.

Provided: living stipend (\$200/month) and housing provided. Interns pay food and personal expenses. Motivated applicants contact ATD Fourth World with any concerns regarding the financial aspects of the internship program. Volunteer Corps Members: Can apply after the internship. Provided: first year stipend is \$540/month; \$720/month thereafter.

Provides: food and lodging (which may be a room shared with another intern) and, if needed, a stipend of up to \$15 per week.

Participants must have at least a high school diploma or GED, and be a U.S. citizen or have permanent residency. Locations: 21 locations in the U.S. Age: 17 or older. If selected, you are placed in a full-time paid apprenticeship with a local nonprofit organization. Period: 10 months. Provided: monthly stipend of \$1,300-\$1,800, health care, child care, student loan deferment, and an education award (see AmeriCorps for more on this).
